STRENGTHS : : The college has a good number of well-qualified staff, selected by the U.P Public Service Commission. The three faculties- Arts, Commerce and science- are fully functional. We have Post Graduate affiliation in 10 out of the 17 Arts subjects specially Persian (because this subject is being taught in a few colleges only), which is a great boon for the students. WEAKNESSES: The College has sent proposals to the Department of Higher Education, U.P. for creating the posts of Commerce and Arts Faculty, but Department has not yet sanctioned the posts. The college library also needs to be upgraded to match the research standards. A number of posts are lying vacant in several departments, which leads to overload of work on the remaining teachers. The Commerce Department is forced to function with a temporary visiting faculty, and subjects like Home Science, Geography, History, Philosophy and Drawing and Painting cannot be offered to students in the absence of any teacher in these departments. There is also a shortage of administrative and technical staff. Besides, grants sanctioned by the U.G.C. take a long time to get released, which hampers the development work of the college, like the construction of a canteen and common room for students. A sickroom for students and teachers is also badly needed. The College suffers from the problem of dropouts as the girl students often get married in the middle of course and consequently leave it. The College also lacks transportation facilities, and students and teachers either have to depend on personal or public transport.

OPPORTUNITIES: The College provides a great opportunity for imparting P.G. level education to girls. It fulfills the idea of the U.P Government of increasing the reach of higher education to the students of rural areas, and to the socially and economically backward classes. The college offers a disciplined campus to the teachers and students, where the ICT technology is also used as a method of teaching. The college is recognized by the U.G.C. under Section 2f and 12 B, which gives the faculty a great opportunity to apply for projects and seminars.

CHALLENGES:- Presently, the Institution has no separate P.G. Blocks despite the existence of PG Courses in 10 subjects. The arrangement of all U.G. and P.G. classes in the small available space poses a huge challenge for teachers and students in achievement of their goals. The small size of the campus is also constraint of non availability of staff quarters. There is no dedicated sports field with facilities for games for the students. **The MJP Rohilkhand University, Bareilly with which our college is affiliated, is situated far off, so matters requiring University approval and notification pose a**

challenge for the management and students, and take long to get resolved. The college comes under the control of the U.P. Government in administrative matters, and under the University, for matters of curriculum and examination, due to which, there is very little scope for experimentation and/or a free hand in decision making; therefore, trying to do one's best under limiting circumstances, itself is a challenging task.
